Norma Eagleton

Norma and John Eagleton lived in Dallas and New Orleans before returning to Tulsa in 1962. They were married 61 years until John's death in 2017. They have two children and five grandchildren.

Norma attended Stephens College in Columbia, Missouri and graduated from The University of Oklahoma. She received her Juris Doctor degree from Oklahoma City University and practiced law in Tulsa for twenty-three years.

In 1976 Norma was elected Finance Commissioner—the first woman to serve as a voting member in Tulsa's City government. She then served ten years as the first woman on the Oklahoma Corporation Commission. She was inducted into the Oklahoma Women's Hall of Fame in 1997 and has lived at Zarrow Pointe since 2015.

Aging Can Be Tough To Swallow

Guest Speaker- Rachel Howard, SLP Friday, March 15th ~ 2:30pm Burnstein Auditorium

It is thought that one quarter of US adults will experience a swallowing problem at some point.

Among other health issues, swallowing difficulties can lead to malnutrition, dehydration, and pneumonia from food and drinks being misdirected into the lungs. Could you be at risk? Yes.

Rachel Howard is a Speech/Language Pathologist here at Zarrow Pointe and is recognized as an expert in her field for her



knowledge of and treatment for swallowing difficulties. Her discussion will focus on a common sense approach to early prevention as well as intervention techniques to treat advanced swallowing issues.

1920: Women have finally won the right to vote in the U.S.
1924: Mrs. Nellie Tayloe Ross of Wyoming becomes the first woman governor in America.

1925: Florence Sabin, one of the foremost scientists of the day, became the first woman elected to the National Academy of Sciences.

1950: Nearly 30 percent of all U.S. women work outside the home.

1957: Althea Gibson became the first black American to play in the U.S. Open, breaking the color barrier in professional tennis. **1972:** Title IX mandates that all schools allocate equal resources to male and female athletic programs.

1976: Women are admitted to the U.S. military academies.

1997: Two of our residents, Norma Eagleton and the late Penny Williams were inducted into the Oklahoma Women's Hall of Fame.

2016: The ban against women in military combat positions is removed.

2017: In 1960 women working the same job as men were paid on average only 60% of what men were paid, but in 2017 it has increased to 80.5%.
